The drawing of glass is also very ancient. Evidence of large-scale drawn-glass bead making has been found by archaeologists in India, at sites like Arekamedu dating to the 2nd century CE.

Purdilnagar, a small town with highest level of skills in bead making and glass work has been reduced down from 200 crores industry to merely 24 crores industry today.

With its early examples, including copper samples from the excavations at Mahurjhari, soon followed by the decorated bangles belonging to the Mauryan Empire (322–185), bangle making has now found its home in Firozabad, the glass hub of India & one of the world's largest glass exporters.

Ironically, every bangle in itself is a handicraft with its own uniqueness, although the bangles are mass produced industrially.

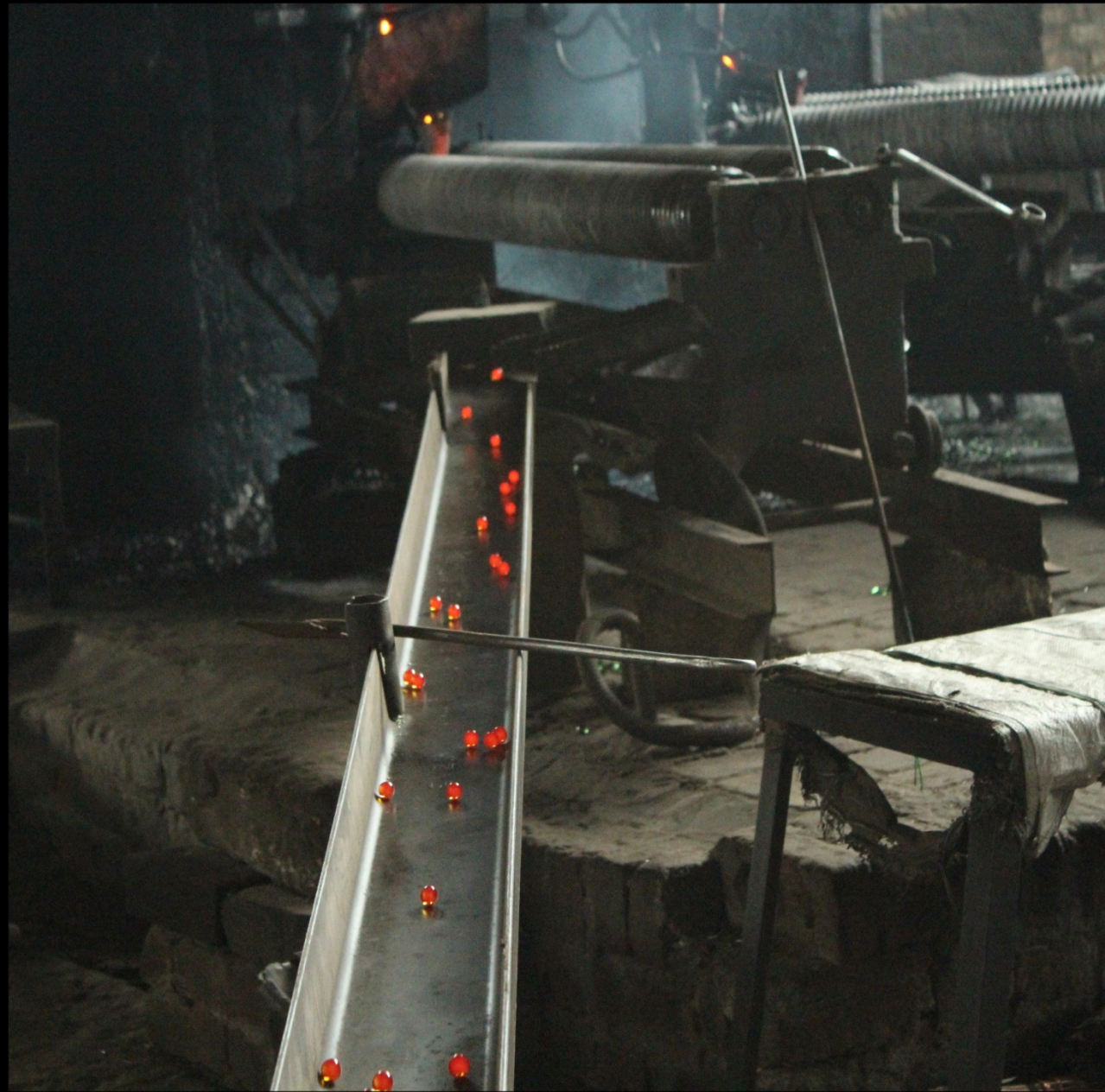

Industry/ Craft : Dhokra Art (Lost wax Casting)

The brilliant copper metal casted figurines, with distinguished detailing inspired by the tribes of West Bengal, is commonly known as the Dokhra Art.

The art has travelled consistently through three states (Madhya Pradesh, Orissa and West Bengal), with their respective characteristics.

With its history going back up till 4000 years, Dokhra art, is a part of India's rich craft heritage and has created a niche in the international markets as well.

This craft was developed in the ending of 19th century for decorative purposes and the designs were based on an inventory of flower-patterned and geometric decorative designs.
